

EXPLORING EXPRESSION AND ILLUSION

ur talented Year 7 pupils have embarked on an exciting artistic exploration, delving into the dramatic world of German expressionism. Inspired by the raw energy and emotion of early 20th-century woodblock prints, pupils have created striking self-portrait poly prints, capturing personal expression through bold lines and dynamic contrast.

In parallel, the students broadened their understanding of global artistic traditions by studying the intricate patterns found in Islamic architecture, textiles and art. They then connected these timeless motifs with the vibrant optical illusions of 1960s Pop Art, discovering the power of repetition and geometry in visual storytelling.

Combining these influences, pupils designed their own bold, graphic pattern compositions which they transformed into three-dimensional paper boxes. Assembled collaboratively, these individual pieces culminated in a visually captivating group installation—an inspiring testament to creativity, cultural appreciation and teamwork.
